## **APPENDIX**

ALLITERATION POEM: The words in each line begin with the same letter of the alphabet; different letters can be used for different lines, or for a real challenge, every word in the poem has to start with the same letter.

EPITAPH: A poem for or about someone who has died.

"FIBS" (from the 'Fibonacci sequence'): A poem with a mathematical progression of syllable counts for each line which is derived from adding the counts from the previous two lines:

- 1 syllable
- 1 syllable
- 2 syllables
- 3 syllables
- 5 syllables
- 8 syllables
- 13 syllables
- 21 syllables, etc.

HAIKU: A three line poem with a syllable count of 5 - 7 - 5.

MINUTE: A 12 line poem consisting of 60 syllables, with a syllable line count of 8-4-4-4-8-4-4-8-4-4-4-4. These are often made up of rhyming couplets.

SONNET: A 14 line poem in three stanzas with a rhyme scheme abab cdcd efef gg. Each letter represents a different rhyming sound, so in the first stanza, the first and third lines rhyme.
